From the Pastor's Heart

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ Jesus,

I've heard it said that a picture is worth 1,000 words. You've probably heard that, too.

As Christians, we often get tongue-tied when trying to witness to the faith that we share. This logo is meant to serve as a visual prompt throughout the year as together we seek to share the Christian faith so that all people may come to know the love of God through Christ Jesus.

Designed collaboratively with Nicholas Carroll, I invite you to study our little logo and consider:

- + A tree, created by the Lord God and placed in the Garden of Eden. This is the Tree of Life (not the Tree of Knowledge of Good and Evil). It is among the trees that God told the first couple they were free to consume. The tree of life represents an eternal, life-giving relationship with God made possible through Jesus Christ. It also reminds us that God provides for our daily needs. We are able to pray with confidence, "Give us this day our daily bread."
- + **The tree trunk and branches**, in the shape of the cross of Jesus Christ. Through his crucifixion, death and resurrection, Jesus promises us forgiveness of sin, salvation and eternal life!
- + The two legs and feet at the bottom of the trunk, reminding us that Jesus is both divine and human. While eternally existing as God, he became flesh (incarnate) and lived a human life.
- + The dove high in the tree, represents the third person of the Holy Trinity: The Holy Spirit. The Bible tells us the Holy Spirit is our "the Helper," who will teach us all things and help us to remember all that Jesus has said to us. Likewise, the Holy Spirit helps us in our weakness, comforts and sustains us, helps us to pray, and provides Continued on next page

us power to be witnesses of the saving grace of God. The Holy Spirit lives in us, convicts us concerning sin, righteousness, and judgment, and enables growth in faith. This gift, given at Holy Baptism, remains with us always.

- + Foliage on the tree, reminding us that Jesus compares the relationship he shared with his disciples to a vine when he said, "I am the vine, you are the branches." The leaves on the tree remind us that likewise, we depend on the trunk for life. In this case, Jesus is the trunk he is the Tree of Life and we are the leaves. Although we are varied in size and color, we are one in Christ Jesus.
- + **As we learn and grow in faith, we are to bear fruit.**Jesus told his disciples:

"This is my commandment, that you love one another as I have loved you. No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends. You are my friends if you do what I command you. I do not call you servants any longer, because the servant does not know what the master is doing, but I have called you friends, because I have made known to you everything that I have heard from my Father. You did not choose me, but I chose you. And I appointed you to go and bear fruit, fruit that will last, so that the Father will give you whatever you ask him in my name. I am giving you these commands so that you may love one another."

John 15:12-17

Beloved sisters and brothers, I thank God for you and for the joy that we have received through the love of Christ Jesus. Let us work together, as leaves on our Lord's family tree, to love one another, to love our neighbor, and to love the stranger. God has appointed us to bear fruit – fruit that will last. Together we can do this.

MAUNDY THURSDAY MANDATUM

The word "MANDATUM" comes from the Latin phrase "Mandatum novum do vobis" (A new command I give you), referring to Jesus' commandment to love one another which Jesus gave the disciples on the night of his Last Supper. "Maundy" is simply a shortened form of it.

On the night in which he was betrayed, our Lord Jesus washed the feet of his disciples, then said to them,

"I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another." John 13:34

Foot washing is a symbolic act of humility, love, and selfless service. Although it is a central focus of worship life for many of our neighbors, we Lutherans often focus on the Lord's Supper to the exclusion of foot-washing.

Ironically, according to the gospel writers, foot washing and the sacrament of Holy Communion were intertwined parts of Jesus' Last Supper. Disciples received Jesus' precious gift love, forgiveness and salvation via his body and blood, as well as his humble gift of love and servanthood via foot washing.

Why is it that we so gladly receive one gift while (seemingly) avoiding the other? Why do we seem far happier to receive the gifts of Jesus' body and blood and their benefits for us, but not his mandate (command!) to love one another, as he loves us?

Let us think and pray on these things.

Mary anointed Jesus' feet with pure nard, this incredibly costly, precious substance. Then she dried his feet with her hair.

In the Gospel story in the last Sunday in Lent, we hear about Jesus visiting with his dear friends, Martha, Mary and Lazarus. This happened just after Jesus had raised Lazarus from the dead. And Mary was anointing Jesus' feet with pure nard, this incredibly costly, precious substance. And then she dried his feet with her hair. Nard is a very powerful, pungent substance, and the Gospel says the room was filled with the fragrance.

Now I did a little research on nard, and some people would describe the smell as being pungent or earthy, or musty, or musky or like feet. So it was an interesting choice that people had in those days. And they did two things with nard. One, they would use nard to anoint the bodies of the dead in order to offset the stench of death, which Jesus had only encountered with his friend Lazarus a few days before. And it was also used for kings as a sign of royalty because of the luxury of this whole thing.

Well, Jesus was himself, like us, like the first Adam, an earth creature — pungent and full of life, dense in this sense. And this earth creature was obedient to death, reversing the work of the first Adam, who disobeyed and brought sin into the world. And we've suffered the consequences. The chief consequence is death, separation from God.

And now Jesus, the new Adam, the new earth creature, he's anointed, he says to Mary, for his burial and so that he will be using this incredibly pungent substance, while at the same time being very clear that he is, in fact, part of this incarnation, this earth creature. But instead of it being oil put on him to remove the stench of death, it became the anointing of a royal king. Through the death and resurrection of Jesus, the usual cycle of life and death has been disrupted forever. Jesus' death and resurrection promises new life and brings us new life.

Happy Easter, dear church.

Who Do You Trust?

This year our Lenten fast of discipline feels more important than ever. Our country and our world are in turmoil. No matter how we try to avoid the elephant in the room, it is there.

There was a time when Facebook and social media didn't exist. I was a freshman in college when Facebook arrived and at that time it was for college students only. It was meant to be a way to connect with classmates, form relationships, and then keep networking with them when you graduated and went out into the world. Believe it or not, you never saw political posts on Facebook in that era. In fact, you couldn't even "laugh" or "angry" react to things, you could only "like" them. We were pretty nice to each other for the most part. Then Facebook expanded to allow everyone on it. Soon it completely shifted into an advertisement and outrage machine rather than a means to keep track of classmates.

Why have politics and misinformation and outright lies taken the center stage of all of our lives? We older people are blessed to remember a time before this, but we need to remember that young people don't even know that this toxic atmosphere isn't normal. I don't think we can blame social media completely. That's because having tasted the fruit of the knowledge of good and evil, we actually do have the ability to not be drawn into the toxic lies and cycles of power-hungry political leaders and insatiable billionaires. We do have the ability to discern, using God's wisdom and the teaching of Jesus, how to react to situations around us. When faced with social media misinformation and there is often too much information for us to all independently be experts on everything and keep up with all topics. So, we have to trust the people who are trustworthy and be suspicious of those who often deceive and cheat their way to their own benefit. I don't think we can merely stop using social media and retract from the world. We instead need to use our Christian wisdom and understanding.

In ancient times a person's "word" was their bond, and their trustworthiness mattered a lot. Out of necessity there was a focus on personal character rather than whether we liked what someone said or not. If you received news by letter or a town-crier, or heard rumors, you couldn't immediately verify it. You had to discern its validity based on your trust in the messenger. We are not so different today. It's impossible to verify everything and so someone's expertise, reliability—trustworthiness...matter.

When it comes to a person's word, as Lutherans we are called to trust Christ the messenger of God, who's word is conveyed to us accurately in the four Gospels of Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John. We read the rest of the Bible through a Christ lens, because it is Jesus, who is our trustworthy messenger. For me I am a Lutheran Christian before I am Republican or Democrat. That means I have to do the difficult and unpopular thing of fitting in almost nowhere in modern society.

I ask you to join me in refocusing on trusting the words of Christ and allowing them to guide our choices in the current tumultuous climate. I have hope, but we must step up and follow Christ's teaching. When the preaching of the Gospel is offensive to political leaders, we must choose the Gospel. We must trust Jesus more than them. We must trust the Gospels and the rest of scripture to convey what Jesus said and feels more than we trust people who use his name to claim trustworthiness. The poor come first. The oppressed come first. The rich are sent away empty.
